

BEGINNING A NEW BEGINNING

Our fall sermon series is rooted in the book of *Genesis*. While we wait for the pandemic to end, God is already at work, beginning a new beginning. God is beginning a new beginning for Saint Pauls, for Chicago, for our families, and our own lives. This series will help attune us to this fact, so that we can feel God's creative power at work right now. We will look through the lens of some of scripture's best stories, asking questions like: What happened before history? How is God at work in times of chaos? Why do our families hurt and heal us? Why is love between siblings so complex? Are faith and morality the same thing? When is it good to laugh at God?

DON'T SIT THIS ONE OUT!

Election Day, November 3, is fast approaching, and this election is gearing up to be one of the most important in our lives with so much at stake for our city, state, and country. The United Church of Christ, through its "**Our Faith Our Vote**" program, believes that no matter your opinion or political affiliations, your voice - your vote - matters. Through voter registration and education (like that supported by our Faith and Public Issues program), members of churches like St. Pauls can, through participation in the political process, support and lift up the common good and the betterment of society. <https://www.ucc.org/ourfaithourvote-get-out-the-vote>.

The late U.S. Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg said, "Real change, enduring change, happens one step at a time." **Help create change** by participating in the 2020 election process by educating yourself about important issues, writing letters to politicians or to voters who might not otherwise vote, personally and perhaps financially supporting the candidates and positions of your choice, and - of course - voting!

ELECTION INVOLVEMENT OPPORTUNITIES

St. Pauls members have asked how they can more actively participate in the upcoming elections. A number of St. Pauls members are already writing and sending letters or calling young or disengaged voters in other states through organizations such as Daily Kos, MoveOn, Sunrise, Swing Left, or Vote Forward. Others are considering participating in Illinois Election Protection, protectthevote.net, 866-OUR-VOTE, a non-partisan organization that supports the right to vote for every eligible voter. Volunteer assignments might include monitoring polling places, watchdogging social media for misinformation, etc. As they feel comfortable, St. Pauls members are urged to consider these opportunities.

SHOULD THE ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION BE AMENDED?

A proposed amendment to the Illinois Constitution will be voted on during the upcoming election period that could cause the greatest change in state taxation in decades. This proposal, dubbed the "Fair Tax" by its sponsors, would replace the current mandated flat-rate Illinois income tax with a graduated-rate tax structure that increases the amount of taxes as income increases.

Supporters believe this type of graduated-rate tax structure is a fair way to shift the tax burden and generate more revenue to end the state's financial structural imbalance, while opponents believe this type of tax structure will harm jobs and note the proposed amendment offers no guarantee that a higher tax rate might ultimately be imposed on middle-class Illinois taxpayers.

The Community Renewal Society (CRS) is a Chicago-based, UCC-related organization, with a mission "to transform society toward greater social justice at the intersection of racism and poverty." CRS strongly supports the Fair Tax amendment. According to CRS, "[t]he Fair Tax will bring billions of much needed revenue to our state to invest in just and safe communities." St. Pauls is a long-time member of CRS. Members of St. Pauls are strongly encouraged to educate themselves about and prayerfully consider the proposed Fair Tax amendment being considered in the upcoming election.


