



ADVENT WREATH


THE CHRISTMAS TREE IS A CHRISMON TREE - A Chrismon is a symbol of Christ. All the designs have been passed down through centuries of Christian tradition and are made of white and gold, to symbolize the purity and the majesty of Christ. Our chrismons have been made by members and friends of St. Pauls, and the tree itself was a gift to the church in 1997 from the Crowley and Opp-Ekdahl families. It takes 15,300 lights to illuminate the 17' tree.


The CIRCLE, a symbol of eternity, of God.




The CROSS, in all its variations, a reminder of the saving work of Christ.



The CROWN, a symbol of the victory of Christ.



The FISH, an early Christian symbol.



The ORB, is Heaven and Earth.



The DESCENDING DOVE, represents the Holy Spirit at Christ's baptism.



The TRIANGLE, THREE INTERTWINED CIRCLES, symbols for one God in three persons, the Trinity.



The STARS are made of crosses, showing the connection between the birth and death of Jesus.



The BUTTERFLY, a symbol of the resurrection.



The DOGWOOD, branches form a cross.



The LILY OF THE VALLEY represents Christ's humility.



ALPHA and OMEGA, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet represent Jesus saying that He is the beginning and the end.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Music Director, Kurt R. Hansen, is wearing a new scapular commissioned from Josefien Stoppelenburg, who is equally talented as a professional artist and singer.

The arrangement of ***O Little Town of Bethlehem*** is by Carl Strommen (b. 1939). He began his college career as a literature major but completed his Master of Music degree at the Eastman School of Music. He has received a number of awards for his compositions from American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP).

The King Shall Come When Morning Dawns uses a text written in 1907 by John Brownlie (1857-1925). He was a Scottish Presbyterian clergy. He was also an educator and wrote a book about hymns and their history. The tune, MORNING SONG, is based on an English folk song, *Old King Cole*, and was first published in 1813.

The tune for ***Lift Up Your Heads***, TRURO, was composed by Charles Burney (1726-1814). Burney was a music historian and composer. He apprenticed with a well known English Baroque composer, Thomas Arne (1710-1778). The words were written by the famous English hymnist and Methodist preacher, Charles Wesley (1707-1788).

The poetry for ***What Child Is This?*** was written by W. Chatterton Dix (1837-1898). He composed many hymn texts, but unlike most hymnodists, Dix was a businessman, not clergy. GREENSLEEVES is an English ballad of unknown origin from the 16th century.

Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence uses a French carol melody, PICARDY, from the 17th century that was harmonized in 1906 by the great 20th century English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). The words are a translation and paraphrase of a hymn from the Greek Liturgy of St. James.

O magnum mysterium was composed in 1994 by Morton Lauridsen (b. 1943). The text is taken from the liturgy for Christmas Day from the *Liber Usualis*, the pre-Vatican II compilation of the propers for all services during a year. Lauridsen is the Chair of the Composition Department at the University of Southern California. He has also been composer-in-residence for the Los Angeles Master Chorale. His music has been recorded by many other ensembles, including Chanticleer. His music is harmonically related to a neo-Romantic tradition and influenced by Palestrina, the Italian Renaissance master of liturgical music. Lauridsen makes great use of the suspension, a chord with notes that are close to each other and “pull” the structure to either resolution or greater tonal tension. His music seems to “glow” and suspends the listener in timelessness between mystery and simple awe.

The text for ***Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus*** was written by the great English hymn writer, Charles Wesley (1707-1788). He wrote more than 6,500 hymn texts. The composer of **HYFRYDOL**, Roland Hugh Prichard (1811-1887), was from Wales and was only 19 when he composed this piece.

César Franck (1822-1890) was the cornerstone composer of French Romantic organ composers. The greatest organist/composers, Vierne and Widor, followed in his footsteps. His ***Grand Choeur*** is another example of pieces that explore all the colors available in an organ the size of our Phoenix.


