





Luke 5:1-11

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' Simon answered, 'Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.



TODAY'S MUSIC

Deck Thyself, My Soul, With Gladness is one of the great German communion hymns. It is often referred to by church musicians as “the queen of communion chorales.” SCHMÜCKE DICH (*Deck Thyself, My Soul, With Gladness*) was composed by Johann Crüger (1598-1662). This hymn, which is also the subject of our Prelude, was set for organ by Bach (1685-1750) and many other German composers. Crüger also composed Nun danket alle Gott (*Now Thank We All Our God*).

The text of ***I Come With Joy*** was written by Brian Wren (b. 1936), who is a pastor in the Congregational Church in England. He wrote the hymn as a summary of a series of sermons on the meaning of communion. The tune is an old American hymn, DOVE OF PEACE, from the *Southern Harmony* hymnal, part of the Sacred Harp tradition. It was arranged by Austin Lovelace (1919-2010), who was Organist and Choirmaster for several years at First United Methodist Church in Evanston.

The text for ***As We Gather at Your Table*** was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister and has a doctorate in English literature. He has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879) and was first found in the great American shape note hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say, tune KINGSFOLD, first appeared in a 19th century collection of English folk melodies, but may date back to the Middle Ages. The text was composed by Scottish clergy, Horatius Bonar (1808-1889). He came from a long line of ministers and composed many hymn texts and religious poems.

Salvation Is Created, Op. 25, No. 5 was composed by Pavel Chesnokov (1877-1944). He was one of the most prolific composers of the Moscow Synodal School. These “hymns” were based on Russian Orthodox chant melodies.

Our **Festival Doxology** is to the German hymn tune *Lasst uns erfreuen*, and dates from 1623. It was first found in a hymnal published in Cologne, Germany.

The tune and text for ***Let Us Break Bread Together***, the well-known communion hymn, are unattributed but became widely known after being printed in 1926 in *The Second Book Of Negro Spirituals*, which was curated and compiled by the famous poet, James Weldon Johnson, and equally prominent composer, J. Rosamond Johnson. The history of the text and tune probably predates the Civil War.

How Firm a Foundation, although of anonymous origin, is a true American hymn first published in Funk's *Genuine Church Music* in 1832. That hymnal is part of what is often referred to as the Sacred Harp, or shape note hymnal, a tradition in our country which began in the early 19th century. These treasures gained a rebirth during the bicentennial celebrations in 1976. Did you know that before the revival of this tune, FOUNDATION, this text was most often sung to the tune *Adeste Fideles (O Come, All Ye*

Faithful)? The text is also unattributed, but first discovered by John Rippon (1751–1836), who was an English Baptist clergy. He noted the author as “K.”

Angels We Have Heard on High is originally an 18th century French Noël (carol) freely translated by James Chadwick (1813-1882), an Irish Catholic priest. GLORIA is from the text of the joyfully cascading Latin refrain, which we sing as a Benediction Response after Christmas and during Epiphany.

I Saw the Light was composed and recorded in 1952 by Hank Williams (1923-1953). He was a beloved country music singer and composer. In his all-too-short life, he recorded 35 singles, 11 of which reached #1 on the Country & Western charts.

TODAY - SHARE THE TABLE OF JESUS

Food prices are rising. Beginning today, we'll be collecting food for the Common Pantry every communion Sunday. St. Pauls helped found the pantry in 1967. Unexpired food and personal items most needed are listed below. Modest-sized products are best for distribution to the folks they serve (e.g., a few 24 oz. containers of cooking oil are preferable to one 64 oz. container). Items can be left in the bin in the Narthex.

Needed: cereal (whole grain, less sugar varieties), nuts, brown rice, jelly/jam (low sugar), peanut butter (natural, no hydrogenated oils), cooking oil, pasta sauce (low sodium), soup (low sodium), easy prep meals (e.g., Hamburger Helper. Look for low sodium or whole grain varieties if possible), ground coffee, toothpaste, deodorant, disposable razors, shampoo, conditioner, mouthwash.

February is Black History Month

Black History Month (aka African American History Month) is an annual celebration to honor the legacy and contributions of African Americans across U.S. history and society. Initially established in 1915 as "Negro History Week" by noted African American Professor Carter C. Woodson, it was originally set in mid-February to coincide with the birthdays of both Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. Woodson incidentally has become known as the "father of Black history." Black History Month grew by 1976 to become an international, one month celebration.
