
If you would like someone to pray with you today, Stephen Ministers are present after the Postlude at the right front of the Sanctuary.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Out of the Depths I Cry to Thee is a text written in 1524 by Martin Luther (1483-1546). The original German of the first line is the tune name, AUS TIEFER NOT. The translation was done in 1863 by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878). Although born in England, her mother was German. Winkworth moved to Dresden where she developed a deep interest in Lutheran chorales. She translated hundreds of German hymns. This setting was harmonized by J. S. Bach (1685-1750).

The music for ***Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee*** (ODE TO JOY) was composed by Beethoven (1770-1827) and is the chorale melody from the final movement of his Ninth Symphony (1824). The original German text (1785) was by the famous poet and dramatist Friedrich Schiller (1759-1805) and the English text was composed in 1907 by Henry Van Dyke (1852-1933). Van Dyke was an American author and clergy. He was appointed ambassador to the Netherlands by President Woodrow Wilson prior to the outbreak of World War I.

E.A. Hoffman (1839-1929) wrote the text for ***What a Covenant***, that many of us learned as *What a Fellowship*, in 1877. He was an ordained minister and wrote more than 2,000 gospel songs in his lifetime. The tune bears two names, LEANING, which is the first word of the refrain, and SHOWALTER, in honor of the composer, A. J. Showalter (1858-1924). He actually began teaching shape-note singing at age 14. He attended a number of private Christian music programs to learn his craft.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791) composed this motet, ***Ave verum corpus***, to a text from the 13th century by Pope Innocent III or IV. This prayer recalls Christ's sacrifice on the cross and where that sacrifice leads us as believers.

Come Ye Sinners Poor and Needy, to the tune RESTORATION, is mined from the wonderful early 19th century American shape-note hymnals including *Southern Harmony*. Its composer and lyricist are unknown, but it was first published in 1835. The melody is characterized by a folk-like swing.

Walk All Over God's Heaven is much more a new creation than an arrangement by Mahallia Jackson (1911 - 1972). She took inspiration from the old hymn *I Got a Robe, You Got a Robe*. Mahallia has a direct connection with St. Pauls. Brendan Henry grew up loving her music and has such a deep spiritual connection that his daughter is named after her. Mahallia Jackson was born in Mississippi, but her connection to Chicago was long and deep. She was fervently committed to the civil rights movement and was behind Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as he spoke at the Lincoln Memorial in 1963. In the recordings of that event, you can hear her shouting to Dr. King, "Tell them about the dream, Martin!" Studs Terkel was among her biggest fans and champions. Although she toured the world, she called Chicago her home and returned to Chicago during her final illness.

NEXT SUNDAY - SHARE THE TABLE OF JESUS

We're collecting food for the Common Pantry every communion Sunday - which is next week. St. Pauls helped found the pantry in 1967. Unexpired food and personal items most needed are listed below. Modest-sized products are best for distribution to the folks they serve (e.g., a few 24 oz. containers of cooking oil are preferable to one 64 oz. container). Items can be left in the bin in the Narthex.

Needed Items: cereal (whole grain, less sugar varieties), nuts, brown rice, jelly/jam (low sugar), peanut butter (natural, no hydrogenated oils), cooking oil, pasta sauce (low sodium), soup (low sodium), easy prep meals (e.g., Hamburger Helper, low sodium or whole grain varieties if possible), ground coffee, toothpaste, deodorant, disposable razors, shampoo, conditioner, mouthwash.
